Every porson who shall deliver to an Assessor any false or fraudulent list or statement, with intent to erade the valuation or enumeration required by law, is subject to a fine of five hundred dellars; nd in such case the list will be made out by the Assessor or Assistant Assessor, and from the valuation and enumeration so made there can be no

Payment of the annual taxes, except those for icenses will not be demanded until the thirtieth day of June.
