CLOVER-HAY FOR HORSES.

Dr. McClure is one of the leading vetrinary surgeons of Philadelphia, and we may therefore, on any matter connected with the Bod and health of the horse can be quoted ith confidence. In a recent article in the Lalturist he advocates the feeding of clover had to horses, and thinks it would provent a disease now prevailing among the horses, dulittle of it being brought to market. He then

p. occeds to sny:

"Why is this the case? Simply because there is a projudice existing among all classes of horsemen, and from them communicated to the owners of horses, against feeding his kind of hay. First, because it is said that clover-hay produces heaves, and secondly be seen feeding with clover-hay, as it looks parsimonious. These opinions concerning article are so widely and firmly fixed in nind of almost every groom and stable-man, as well as horse owners in Philadelphia, hat I believe it has been the cause why most farmers are not found giving clover cultivation to the extent it ought to be, or as its superiority as an article of provender demands. Let us now examine in brief, the objections

that are laid against it. It is said it will aduce heaves in horses. The idea is as the ast it is preposterous. If broken wind produced by an article of food, it certainly not from food, but from the quantity given. In like manner, heaves may be caused by a an like manner, heaves may be caused by a too great quantity of water, oats, or any kind of hay whatever, given at an improper time, as when the animal has a journey to perform in a word, it is the person's fault in giving too much food at an improper time, not the character of the food that thus produces heaves in the herse. The man, who, when beding a horse, would fill his manger with 's and corn, would not be considered a very at man to feed and care for horses, neither is but man who would fill a large rack full of wor-hay; as the animal will not stop eatantil it has hurt itself; as every horse is and of it, and, as before stated, sick horses will eat it when they will not eat anything else. Without another word the argument i sumplete."

SELECTION OF FRUIT TREES.

It is not the largest and finest looking trees that are the best. In fact, the eageri proportion of roots, which it is impractito take up with such trees, often results not only in the loss of the trees themselves by death, but it frequently requires years for them to recover and regain their thrifty state. Neither is it necessary that the tree owth fills up the crooks in a trauk, and ikes it as straight, or nearly so, as any oth-

The three great points are: To have healthy t. ees—to take them up with as perfect, rots as possible—and to keep these moist and uninjured till they are set out again.—These three requisites cannot be easily secured by taking large trees, while those of moderate or rather small size readily furnish them all. Small trees are easily dug without mutilating the roots; they are packed for ansportation safely and with facility; the Nor of digging and packing, and the cost of transportation, are much less than with large rees, and they commence growing immediately, with little check in their vigor, and if well cultivated, make the largest as well as the best trees at the end of five years.

The late Dr. Kennicort, who was a successful nurseryman as well as orcharadist, said, that of the trees which he sold to his customers, the full-sized symmetrical ones never grew so well as the smaller ones, pos-sessing less beauty of form. The reason was a curious one; he could never succeed in persuading the owners to shorten in the heads of the handsome trees, while he could induce them to prune or cut back the others according to any directions he might give.

To sum up—procure small, healthy, welljug and well packed trees, of the best proved sorts, only from reliable nurserymen; let them be well set out and well cultivated for Ladies' hats, home made lanksts. five or successive years, and they will afford a profitable as well as satisfactory result.

THE FRUIT TREE BORER .- The Gardner's Monthly mentions that a friend, who is fa-mous for his success in fruit culture, especially in growing large crops of the finest apples, informed him that the secret of his 'good luck' consisted in 'keeping away the cloths, corer." To do this he says, "I merely keep the soil scraped from the trunk down to the bare roots winter and summer." Hispargument in favor of his management is that the borer requires moist, soft bark for his operations, and that the removal of the soil from the trunk of the tree, rendering the bark firm and hard to the collar, instinctively causes the borer to select a more favorable place for the rearing of its young—or, more correctly speaking, for its chrysalis. The treatment thus described was perfectly successful; the trees were untouched by the borer.

PRESERVING GRAPES .- Mr. F. J. Boving, of Lancaster, Ohio, has leen very successful in preserving grapes during the winter in the following manner: On a clear, dry day he gathers perfectly ripe and sound bunches, and lays them carefully in stone jars holding one or two gallons each. The jars are then set in the ground in a trench deep enough to allow their tops to be eight or ten inches bolow the surface. Some boards are then laid over the jars, the trench filled up over it. Grapes packed in this way keep perfectly well until the first of March, and he has some yet untouched to test the length of time they can be preserved. Mr. B. exhibited some of his grapes to an extensive grower of the fruit, who offered to buy his secret, but he prefers to make it public through the American Agriculturist. It is well to make a note of this for reference and

FENCING STUFF.—Fencing stuff may be Glue, gotten out in the woods before the sap rises, and if the time presses cut the trees down. 


