prouf, riot and confusion has seldom been vitnessed in the old Border city. The two liberal candidates, Messrs. Lawson and Potand the Conservative candidate, Mr. lodgson, were severally nominated. Mr. Potter experienced a similar treatment at the hands of the mob, nd he concluded his address amid a fusilade powder and unclean things. The riot, owever, culminated on the appearance of Conservative candidate. When Mr. the Conservative candidate. When Mr. Hodgson presented himself to the crowd the proar became so terrific as to threaten seficus consequences. Some one in the crowd discharged a pistol, and stones beginning to supply the place of sout and other, &c., blood as drawn in several parts of the crowd.-The Mayor, after frequently retiring to the own hall for momentary slielter, directed the solice to clear the space in front of the hustngs. The police endeavored to do so with-

at effect, and the rioting continued, during which it was impossible for Mr. Hodgson to obtain a hearing. The Mayor then called for a show of hands, which he announced to be in favor of W.m. Nicholson Hodgson and Edmund Potter. This announcement roused the ire of the multitude to the extremest pitch, and the hustings was almost immediately cleared by missiles, the favor of the mob being showered with particular aim at the Mayor, who, with other gentlemen on the hustings, was covered with powder of all colors—blue, yellow, white and green. The candidates were pitilessly assailed, heavy bags of whiting and soot coming repeatedly in their faces, and but for the shelter of strong and friendly umbrellas, it must have resulted in serious personal injury. The usual vote of thanks was not proposed, it being the first thought of every one to escape. The proceedings throughout were of the most riotous and unseemly character, a constant shower of colored powder-bags, soot-bags, potatoes, rotten eggs and stale butchers' offal, being poured upon the candidates and their friends. The speeches were in consequence out snort, all attempts at dislodging "roughs" being unsuccessful. In fact it was the most disgraceful exhibition ever witness-ed in Cumberland."
