OUR SHORT PREIT LIST. We again present to our readers, as the time approaches for transplanting, a revised list of Fruit Trees, Vines, &c., which we can recommend for general cultiva-tion. One dozen variety of pears, and six of apples, are all-sufficient, provided they are the best adapted to the soil and locality—a fact which each one, upon trial, must judge for himself. Frequently, a pear, or apple, or a grape, may do well for a few years and then deteriorate; or may do excellently well in one location, and not in another, though separated by a very narrow space. In such case it had better be disposed of by grafting it with more reliable varieties. We have changed on opinion respecting a number of fruits within the last half dozen years, and yet some of the instances we are convinced

The Adirondae is one of these of most promise, and we do not think there is any risk in recommending it. The long is another which may also turn out to be worthy of cultivation. Several of Rogers' Hybrids likewise claim a leading place. This season's experience will enable us to form a pretty good judgment of them, so that our next list may be considerably changed. With the Maxatawny we are not fully satisfied; while the fruit is equal not fully satisfied; while the fruit is equal in point of merit to any other, the vine with us loses its leaves before the grapes are matured, and many of them fall off. We have consequently removed it from

The Hudson River is an excellent berry, rather better in quality than the Hornet, which it re-sembles, though not so large, but it is not hardy or a good grower, and unless care is taken will "run out" in a few years. The Catawissa is the two-crop variety, which every one ought to cultivate for the autumn crop only, by cutting all the caneclean off to the ground in November and covering the stools with manure.

The New Rochelle blackberry produces a better crop perhaps than the borehester, and the latter ripened berries retain their flavor more entirely; but the first ripening of the Dorchester is sweeter and more delicious than the other.

It is better that those who intend to cultivate fruit and have to make purchases, should take this list with them to the nursery, and adhere to it as far as possible. It is not fair to the nursery man to ask him for a list of the best sorts, as he has all : kinds to sell to accommodate every taste and demand. - Germantown Telegraph.

Sound Maxims in Farming .- The following remarks are from an old pamphlet which accidentally came into the hands of a correspondent who bas kind-

ly sent them for publication. They are well worth remembering:
The gentleman of fortune, whose farm rie genteman of fortune, whose farm is his amusement, may wait years for his reward. The common farmer wants his pay down. Plaus of improvement have been recommended, practicable indeed to the man of wealth, but wholly uninteresting to the mass of farmers, because beautiful their mans. beyond their means. They can adopt no system which the farm itself will not support. It is a maxim in husbandry, that no mode of management is worth pursuing, that will not give a profit; and that is the best which will afford the greatest profit with the least labor and ex-

Great crops may be obtained at great expense; but if the labor and expense is not remunerated, the crops themselves will be ruinous. The question is, not how a great crop can be obtained? But how it can be obtained in a manner to pay? It is not a valuable improvement in pry? It is not a valuable improvement in husbandry to increase your productions, if your expense is proportionably in-creased. The great object is, to increase the productiveness of a farm, so that the expense may bear a less ratio to the increase. By purchasing more land, you impose a burden on yourself difficult to sustain. Many have been impoverished. and not a few have been ruined, by possessing themselves of land for which they could not pay. The intelligent farmer before he plunges into debt, will not fail to attend to this plain question. Will the income of the intended purchase more than repay the interest, the labor and the If not, you are better without the land. The possession of more land than can be improved is a tax upon the owner.
