FLOUR.—The market is in a very excited state, owing to the late advance in gold. There is no shipping demand, but prices are fully maintained. The home consumers are buying in a small way at \$8.50 @ 1 for superfine; \$9.25 @ 10 25 for extra; \$11 @ 12 50 for Northwest extra family; Penna, and Ohlo do. do. at \$12 @ 14, and fancy brands from \$15 @ 16 per bbl. In Itye Flour and Corn meal no change. The recipts to day are: 1800 bbls. Flour, \$100 bbls. Wheat, 2200 bus. Corn, \$500 bus. Oats.

Grain.—There is verry little good Wheat here, and we have not heard of any sales worthy of note. Spring is quoted at \$2 45 @ 250 per bushel. The last sales of Pennsylvania Rye were at \$1.80. Corn is in fair demand, and we notice further sales of 4000 bus. at \$1 @ 105 for yelloy, and \$7c. for Western mixed to arrive. Oats are in steady demand, with sales of 1000 bushels Pennsylvania at 74c; 200 bushels Western at 50 @ 622/50, and 3500 do. No. 2 do, at 00c. In Barley and Malt no change.


