On no occasion will any of the family need to occupy it; and there will be such convenience that the guest will come out ready for the breakfast table. This room not only represents several thousand dollars, but also good furniture, and shade in summer.—In most families this room is not obtained until the oldest girl has a beau, or the oldest boy gets the mitten. Moreover, the folks have early oucumbers; and, from July till frost, sweet corn. Every morning the fire is built of dry wood; twice f day, the year round, there is milk to strain; horses are not heard stamping in the night; the hogs cannot run, nobody—eats poor butter, or drinks coffee without cream; pickles are taken out of elder vinegar; if a child has a sore throat, there is no running to a noighbor's for honey; even in September a few hens are kind enough to lay; if the old man suddenly starts for the county seat, a package of cake and cheese is handed him, and he does not mutter because a clean shirt is not ready; in May, some apples can be found in the bottoms of barrols, and in August there is lard in crocks and pork in the brine. Y. Tribune.

LATE VS. EARLY COLTS.

In conversing with some of the gentle-men practically familiar with the subject of breeding, who were in attendance at the recent exhibition of horses in this city, we found it to be the opinion of many of them that it was far better to city, we found it to be the opinion of many of them that it was far better to have coits dropped late in the season than in the spring, as is now the almost universal practice, and in some sections of the State the former is fast gaining favor. It certainly has many advantages.—Where coits come in the spring and are taken off at the approach of cold weather, they are poorly litted to withstand the severe season of winter, are obliged to be kept on dry forage, if given a little grain as an extra feed, they are often lujured by it, as their system is easily thrown out of order thereby, and they almost invariably come out in the spring very poor.—Now it seems to us these disadvantages can be most completely overcome by just reversing, the general order. Have colts come in the fall, say about the last of August, and let them remain with the mare through the winter. Provide a large stall, have the floor well furnished with straw, sawdust or fine shavings as a litter, and turn them in together loose. Feed the mare well, giving a moderate quantity of grain. This will make the milk richer, and consequently the colt will receive full benefit of the grain without the ill results attending the feeding it directly to them when young. Then in the spring, with fresh starting of the new, tender grass, the colt can be taken off and enclosed in some spot where he can have a choice "bite," where, in a short time, he will be all ready to go on growing, and hy fall, will have attained sufficient age, and practice in "foraging," to withstand the winter well. The matter is worthy of attention by all who are engaged in breeding.—Maine Farmer.

A RECEIPT WORTH ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS.—The Ohio Cultivator says: Take one pound of sal-soda and a half pound of unslack lime, put them in a gallon of water and boil twenty minutes, let it stand till cool, then drain off, and put in a strong jug or jar; soak your dirty clothes over night, or until they are wet through, then wring them out and rub on plenty of soap, and in one boiler of clothes well covered with water, add one teacupful of washing fluid; boil half an hour briskly, then wash them thoroughly through one suds, rinse, and your clothes will look better than the old way of washing twice before boiling. This is an invaluable receiver with the says. of washing twice before boiling. This is an invaluable receipt, and I want every poor tired woman to try it. I think with a patent wash-tub to do the little rubbing the washer-woman might take the old bible and compose herself on a lounge and let the washing do itself.

PLANT PEAS DEEP.—The theory recently advocated of planting peas very deeply in the earth, in ofder to prolong the bearing capacity of the vines, has been well tested and found to be correct. A farmer ploughed a furrow beam deep, then scattered the seed beds at the bottom, atter which he turned a deep furrow upon them with his plough, covering them to the depth of twelve or fourteen inches. They pushed their way up through the thick mass of earth very soon, and instead of turning yellow at the bottom and dying after the first gathering, they blossomed and bore until he was tired picking the pods. If such a result will uniformly be realized from the plan, pea culture may be more profitable than heretofore.

CORN MARKER.—A farmer at Chester-field, Ill., describes a simple and cheap corn marker. It is made by putting a short axle in the forward wheels of a wagon, and a long one in the hind ones; couple them together by a six feet stick pinued on the hind axle, and running to the centre of the coupling; the wagon tongue can be put on the front axle by two small iron bolts put through the ends of the hounds and axle; the axles can be made of poles. Put the front wheels four feet apart, and the other twelve feet, though the length of the axle can be made to suit. Sixty acres in a day can be marked with it. It runs light, and makes a good mark, and one that will show after a rain as good as a sled mark.

TRAINING HEIFERS.—A Pennsylvania farmer who has trained and milked heifers for more than fifty years, and never had any trouble about their jumping, kicking or running, gives the rural American the following secret: "When I intend to raise a heifer calf for a milk cow, I always "raise it by hand" and when feeding frequently, handle it by rubbing it gently down over the head and neck until it becomes tame and gentle.—The rubbing is done at the first feeding with milk, and continued until I quit feeding it; I never afterward had any trouble about milking them.

POINTS IN A GOOD MILKER.—A correspondent in the Country Gentleman says:

'In selecting a milker, look well to the udder. Before milking it should be wide and broad, not hanging down like a sack, and hard and shiny, nearly destitute of hair, and what there is should be fine, short and bright. After milking, the udder should be soft and apparently a skin bag. If after milking, the udder is hard and full, it shows that it is flesh, not milk, that distends it."
