## KINDNESS TO ANIMALS.

Prof. Youatt gives the following interesting fact in one of his valuable "A horse in the depot at Woodwich had proved so unmanageable to the rough riders that at length no one among them durst even mount him.— His mode of throwing or dismounting his rider consisted in lying down and rolling over him, or else crushing his leg against some wall, or post, or pal-ing. All means to break him of these perilous tricks proving unavailing, the animal was brought before the commanding officer with the character "incivably vicious," and with a recommendation, on that account, that he should be sold. Colonel Quest, nearing of this, and knowing the horse to be thoroughly bred and one of the best actioned and clewerest horses in the regiment, becought the commanding officer to permit him to be transferred to the riding troops. This was consented to, and the transfer was no sooner accomplished than Col. Quest determined to pursue a system of management directly opposite to that which had been already attempted; he had him led daily into the riding school, suffered no whips even to be shown to him while there, but petted him and tried to make him execute this and the other manouvre, and as he proved obedient rewarded him with a handful of corn or beans, or a piece of bread, with which bribes his pockets were invariably well supplied. In this manner, and in no, great distance of time, was the rebel not only subdued and tamed, but rendered so perfectly quiet that a little child could ride him. He became at length, taught to kneel down while his rider mounted, and to perform several evolutions and dences and tricks in the menage, which no other horse in the school could be brought to do. In fine, so great a favorite did he become, that his master gave him the appellgtion of "Darling."

FROST HELPS THE FARMER.—In this climate winter rarely sets in until from frequent and heavy rains the ground is pretty thoroughly saturated with water. It would be a misfortune to the agriculturist to have the soil freeze solid and permanently for the season on the heels of a drought. Wells and springs would fall in the winter time, and the action of frost could not prove so beneficial to land as if larger quantities of water were present in it. Few take note of the actual effect of freezing and thawing upon all kinds of soil, more especially on the heavy and therefore retentive ones. These most need the action of the frost and nature has gravided for them to receive it to a lar ger extent than naturally light, porous soils. The water is dispered all through the pores of the soil, and by its expansion when frozen it cracks, pulverizes, lifts apart the particles from each other, to a mare minute degree than it is possible to accomplish by any mechinery. While this action is favorable to the extension of the roots of plants it doubtless sets free much when the PROST HELPS THE FARMER. -- In this positive to accomplish by any machinery. While this action is favorable to the extension of the roots of plants it doubtless sets free much plant food which is physically so combined as fertillizers. So the looser the soil is left before winter, the better will be the action of frost upon it. On heavy lands, spaded gardens and plowed fields late in autumn are signs of good husbandry.

Fattening animals of all kinds lay on flesh very rapidly as the weather grows cooler. Keep beeves and sheep in pasture as long as the feed is good, but yard them at night, and feed twice a day with grain, if they are to be marketed soon; otherwise simply feed so as to be sure they are constantly gaining Pigsshould have cooked food, and plonty of it. Push forward their fattening as rapidly as possible, for at no season will they gain faster. Keep them clean, and give them warm, sheltered nests. Poultry also gain very rapidly, and it is best to fatten them on scalded meal, with corn, wheat screenings, and other food in addition, at daylight in the morning and late in the afternoon.

Coal Oil for Rheumatism.—I wish to inquire if your readers are aware what a valuable remedy the common coal oil is in rheumatic ases? I have been using considerable of it lately, and have found almost immediate relief from it. It is surprising how suple and free from pain it will render some of our old stiff backs, suffering from all sorts of "cricks," and the weight of divers scores of years. So very valuable a remedy deserves to be more generally known, as its cheapness and abundance renders it generally accessible. Care should be exercised in using at night before lamp or fire light, as it sometimes explodes.—Co. Gent.

PRESERVING POTATOES.—A correspondent of the Scientific American says, that he tried the following method of keeping potatoes for years, with complete success: Dust over the floor of the bin with lime, and put in six or seven inches deep of potatoes, and dust with lime as before. One bushel of lime will do for forty of potatoes.
