CULTIVATION OF THE GOUBER OR PEANUT.

The peanut has an annual root: a pro cumbent stem from nine to eighteen inchesiong. The flowers are a butter-fly shaped, the barren ones yellow and small, and the fertile large and white. The ovary gradually elongates, and curving downward buries itself in the earth, where it matures. The seeds are full of oil, which when expressed is said to be in power.

The plant is tropical, and is largely cultivated in hot countries for food. The seeds are eaten both raw and roasted. The peanut has been very successfully cultivated in all the Southern States, and has found a ready market at remunerative prices.—We understand that the attention of many farmers in Middle Tennessee has been directed to the cultivation of the peanut, which has been grown very successfully where tried.

Select a rich sandy beam, such a spot as would be suitable for the spring, crossplow, harrow, and pulverize in thoroughly. Check it off with a unit-tongue, three foet apart. This preparation must be made by the middle of Apart, at which time the planting must be commenced, if the frost has entirely disappeared. Put four to six peas in cach check, covering lightly with a hoe or we den harrow.—Or the pea may be planted in drills, eighteen linehes apart, the roas the same width as when planted in checks. After the pea is high enough to pow, run the tar of the plow as close as possible to the plant, plowing out the modific as you would corn. After the apse of ten or twelve days, plow the second time. Then level the surface around the plant, hilling just enough to keep from settling upon the growing stalk. The work or cultivating the peanut will then be mainly over, undes rain should set in. Then perhaps it will be necessary to plow again in order to keep down the grass and weeds.—After the plants have bloomed and the fertile blooms commence curving downward, it will be necessary about once a week to cover the times -afficiently to prevent their growth and encourage the pea, leaving the ends of the vines exposed. This must be done with a hoc or shovel, the drit being thrown upon the vines lightly, at the same time cutting and scraping away the weeds and grass. 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




