Agricultural.

Most farmers would plow their lands Anost farmers would plow their lands two or three inches deeper than they now do, if it were not so hard work for their teams. A pair of horses will turn a furrow seven or eight inches deep, and plow an acre and a-half or two acres a day; but when the plow is run to ten or twelve inches, it is too hard for most teams to draw it; consequently. for most teams to draw it : consequently. many farmers prefer to plow more shallow, and take their chances for a good

For corn, when sod ground is turned over, it is not advisable to plow only just deep enough to turn the sod over flat, with some six inches of the earth flat, with some six inches of the earth beside, making with sod and all about eight inches. This is about as deep as sod land should ever be plowed, because when you go deeper, the sod is turned more upon its edges, which is a bad system of plowing; but the next time the land is plowed, after the sod has become rotted, it would be well to plow a foot deep, at least, and some soils 15 to 18 inches would be better, if one has teams to do it, two pair of horses, or two yoke to do it, two pair of horses, or two yoke

of oxen.

Not all soils, however, will bear plowing so deep, and be advantageous.—

How to Make Vinegar Frequently 1 read, in the public press, inquiries how to make vinegar. I now propose to give directions how any famity may have a continuous supply from year to year of the best eider vinegar.—
First, about the casks. As many as two are needed—one to contain eider, and one in which to make vinegar.—
They hould be supplyed. They should be of seasoned oak, free from sap, with heavy fron hoops, and well painted. If ordinary wooded hooped barrels are used they must be overhauled by a cooper once in two years, and four new hoops, at least, put on each barrel whether they appear at the time to need new hoops or not. If the cooper says the old hoops are good the cooper says the old hoops are good enough, insist on the new ones being put on. Without this care the hoops, in some peculiar state of the weather, will suddenly snap, the barrels burst, and the cellar will be floated with vinegar, to your great chagrin, not only from the loss of vinegar, but also, because of the incongruous mixtures which sometimes occur at such times. Prepare a suitable stand in the cellar for the barrels, on which they may rest "bung up a suitable stand in the cellar for the bar-ers, on which they may rest "bang up bage free." As soon as it is in the tassel, go through it with the corn knife, and cut all weeds close to the ground, so as to let in the air and sun-shine to mature the crop.—September 10th to 20th, cut up and put about twenty hills in a stock. October let to 15th, husk and crib.

I have in this way raised 1,750 bushels of sound ears on 11½ acres, and heavier crops per acre on smaller pieces. Try




