

For Bleaching—Use one quart of a powerful chloride of lime for every ten quarts of cloth. Boil the lime in a quart of water until clear, which will take about one hour, then take it off the fire and let it stand until settled. When settled, strain through a cloth, but do not drain very closely. Wash the cloth and boil in soap, then put the lime-water into a boiler on the stove, with water enough to cover the cloth. Put in the cloth and heat slowly twenty minutes, then take it out and rinse thoroughly, and leave it in clear water over night. Then wring it out, but do not wring it too hard, then put it in the lime-water again, and wash it with water until it is perfectly clean, and you will find your cloth as white as that you buy already bleached, and without that false dressing or starch which so often injures the strength of what you buy.
