TRIMMING TREES.—The present sea son is the proper time to attend to this work, before the sap begins to ascend from the roots to the trunk and limbs, and thus insure a plentiful growth of shoots and consequently an abundant foliage, which as every housekeeper knows, is very desirable thing around one's dwelling during the sultry months of summer. Next month will do for preparing and planting out young trees, but it is rather too late for trimming. In this section too little attention is paid to a proper time for trimming, and too many prune in the latter part of April and in May, when buds are not only ready to burst. but even are open. We have found from our own limited experience that this is the time to trim grape vines, and we never knew of one thus managed not to flourish and bear abundantly.

STILL AT IT.-The velocipede mania still continues. The young men have all got it bad, and some of the old ones have developed strong symptoms. The complaint is said to come from Paris, which accounts for its being so fashionable.-When the Parisians began eating horse fiesh, they fell back on the velocipede, as means of locomotion. The velocipede has liberated the noble animal from har ness, and he may hereafter be converted into soup and steaks. Every yelocipe dist'is his own horse; he can barness himself up at a moment's notice, but if he should drive himself to destruction, he might be arrested under the laws for the prevention of cruelty to animals—the donkey being an animal. The velocipede has many advantages over the horse; it don't cost so much; it don't ext oats or shavings; it never gets the bots or heaves: it doesn't get scared and run off; it will ille down without being told; it don't need shoes on blankets; it don't kick .--The age to which a velocipede will prolbably attain, has not been definitely determined, but it is generally supposed that one properly constructed out of good material will last until it wears out.
