THE NEXT CENSUS IN EASTERN PENN-SYLVANIA.—Gen. Gregory, the Marshal for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania; has received voluminous instructions from the Secretary of the Interior and Superintendent of the Census. The gist of the instructions are that the Census will be made upon the basis of the act of 1850, which gives the selection of the Assistant Marshals to the District Marshal, and the duty devolves upon him of dividing his districts into sub-districts for the convenience of collecting the infor nation desired. The law provides that he shall sub-divide his district into smaller districts, of not less than 20,000 inhabitants in one sub-district. General dregory's jurisdiction comprises the following counties in Eastern Pennsylvania: Adams, Bucks, Berks, Carbon, Chester Cumberland, Dauphin, Delaware, Franklin, Lancaster, Lebanon, Lehigh, Monroe, Montgomery, Northampton, Perry, Philadelphia, Pike, Schuylkill, Wayne, and York.
