PROFANITY PUNISHABLE.—It seems ot to be known to any considerable exent that persons indulging in profanity subject themselves to a fine or imprisonient Every adust who curses and in oursing uses the name of either of the hree persons in the Trinity, is liable to e fined sixty-seven cents for each curse, and every minor for each similar offence may be punished by a fine of forty cents for each profane utterance. Failing to meet these obligations adults can be imorisoned for twenty-four hours for each affence and minors for twelve hours. If forced here, the borough treasury would soon be overflowed with funds, or our county prison inadequate to accommodate the one-thousandth part of the oflenders.

POT.—The foundation of the long promised Depot building of the Cumberland-Valley Road has at last been laid, and the ground plan of the proposed building s now lying before us. The brick buildng will have a front of twenty two and vill extend back eighty-four feet. In front will be a platform six feet wide with a door opening into the first room. vhich will be set aside for the accommodation of gentlemen; and from it there will be a door opening into the ticket office which comes next. The ladies room will join the ticket office in the rear, and will be but a fraction smaller than the front room. Then will come a capacious baggaze room and the usual empartments for the convenience of travelers. Along the whole of the west side of this building, and extending some distance beyond it to the south, will be a overed platform fourteen and a half feet wide, which will be under the same roof that covers the mason work-that is so far as the platform is co-extensive with the house. There will also be an extension of the platform two and a half feet beyond the roof, from which it will be an easy step to the car.
