LOCAL OPTION. -Our ultra temperance friends were, inst week, taken somewhat ny surprise when Ju ige Junkin rendered his decision declaring the Local Option aw unconstitutional, and in licensing the Shippensburg applicants in the face of that law In his opinion Judge Junkin is not alone, as many of the lawyers n the State have expressed opinions precisely similar. It is contended by them that it is unconstitutional, because it does not make the law positive, but makes it onditional, by referring it to a vote of the people. Eventually this question will be leclided by the Supreme Court, as the ocarry it up. What that Court will do remains to be seen. A contemporary says the Court has decided both ways already. It held, some years ago, that local option, in some kind of shape, was unconstitu-tional, because the majority of the people decided what was to be done, or what was not to be done. But, it decided that he law relative to the sale of the State improvements, which was decided by rute of the people, was constitutional. And it never was questioned successfully that school districts had the legal right o decide by vote whether the common chool system should or should not be esablished in them. The principle of local or general option appears to run through all these measures. But the Supreme Court is the court of last resort, and by its decision must we all abide, its yea and its nay being final. The question, however, will afford fine pickings for our friends the lawyers, as every disputed oint in law is fish to their not.
