It is most remarkable that not a single Latter-Day Saint received any injury from this accident, although the ceiling was heavy, and was quite one-half of the ceiling of the whole hall, while attached thereto were the heavy pieces of timber which previously supported it. It is also singular that the portion of the ceiling beneath which the "elders" or "prophets" sat, was perfectly uniqued and sound.

This Bridge was erected at a cost of \$157,700, and comists of two stone abutunents and twenty-eight stone piers, (built with the best material upon sure and solid foundations,) and twenty-eine spans or arches. The superstructure is of wood, upon Burr's approved plan, with three arched segments to each span, making two carriage ways. The whole work is most substantially done, and is in excellent condition.

The floor is made double with two inch white pine and oak plank. A single track of railway is laid on each carriage way. The whole is covered with a good shingle roof, and whitewashed inside and ott-ide. Lightning rods are erected on the roof at the end of each span.
