Operations of Commodore Farragut on the Mississippi.

CAIRO, May 24.—A despatch from Halleck's headquarters, dated to-day, says:—The Memphis Appeal of the 22d instant says that Governor Pettus, of Mississippi, has called for four thousand armed men to rendezvous at Vicksburg, ammunition to be procured at the latter place.

Vicksburg, May 21.—The Federal Commander has ordered the removal of the women and children from this city in 24 hours. The Mayor has asked until Friday, the 23d, to block a city.

The Corinth correspondent of the Appeal deprecates the death of Colonel Ingraham, of Yan Dorn's staff, who, he says, was inhumanly butchered by the Federals in the skirmish on the 9th.

The same correspondent says that Beauregard is about to confer the order of the Southern Cross of Honor on the privates of the Ninth Texas Regiment for gallant conduct. They will be the first to receive this much coveted badge of distinction.

The Vicksburg Citizen of the 18th says: The grocery stores are all moved away except one, and the stock in that will be exhausted in two or three days. It becomes a serious question where groceries will be procured after this.

The Raleigh Register says, Mrs. Jeff Davis arrived there on the 11th under the escort of Senator Gwynn, of California, accompanied by her four children, Mrs. Kearney, Jeff's niece, Mr. Gwynn, son and daughter.

A Jackson, Miss., despatch of the 18th says: Five Yankee gunboats arrived within range of our batteries at Vicksburg yesterday noon. The commander sent a flag of truce demanding the surrender of the city. We answered, if you want up the city and take it. The fleet then communicated with the commander of the Confederate troops, demanding it, is supposed, the surrender of our forts just below Vicksburg, which was promptly and pointedly refused.
