Rebel Movements.

Rolls, July 29 .- At Stillville, on Sunlay night, it was estimated that at least 1,500 mounted armed men had crossed the State road, from Potosi to Jefferson-within ten miles of that place-for Dixie. About 1.500 have organized and put out from Salem and vicinity within three days.

Within that time they have stampeded across the railroad in great numbers between Rolla and Merrimac. They took horses, clothing, arms, ammunition and supplies of every kind, which they require everywhere they found them. A merchant was robbed of one hundred dollars in clothing and goods.
