In pursuance of the sixth section of the Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to sup-Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to suppress insurrection, to punish treason and mebellion, to seize and confiscate the property of rebols, and for other purposes," approved July 17, 1862, and which Act, and the joint resolution explanatory thereof, are applicable of the property of the property of rebols, and which Act, and the joint resolution explanatory thereof, are applicable of the property of the proper herewith published, I, Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States, do hereby proclaim to and warn all persons within the contemplation of the said sixth section, to cease participating, aiding, countenancing, or abetting the existing rebellion, or any rebellion, against the Government of the United States, and to return to their proper al-legiance to the United States, on pain of the forfeitures and seizures as within and by said sixth section are provided.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the scal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington, the 25th day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and of the Independence of the United States the eighty-seventh. ABRAHAM LINCOLN.
