Every person, excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States, or of this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordanate officer or agent, who is or shall be employed under the Legislature, Exceutive or Judiciary departments of the State or the United States, or of the State Legislature, and of the Stelet and Cornon Connells of any city, or Commissioner of any incorporated district, is, by law, in expable of holding or excrecing at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and no inspector, judge or other officer of any such election shall be eligible there to be voted for.
