We were present at "Frohman's" a few evenings since, and must say it was a rich treat. The display is essentially a new one in our community, and combines instruction with amusement. - The scenes they have taken show good taste in the selections. These characters are delineated with such simplicity of thought, and graphic force of meaning, which affords the clearest insight. CHRISTIAN COMMISSION. - A union meeting was held in the M. E. Church, on Sunday evening last, which was addressed by Rev. C. P. Lyford, a member of the "Christian Commission," and who has just returned from the Hospitals at Fredericksburg, and the "Wilderness," where he has been administering to our sick and wounded soldiers. He gave a vivid description of the great contest between the two armies, and described the situation of the contending hosts - the order of battle, and the various movements of the army and "Commission" were beautifully described by the gifted speaker.

He gave a synopsis of what the Christian Commission and its branches had done, and of the great good it was now doing. He described their work - in the army as one constant change - no continued sameness - made up of many distinct campaigns. This work the "delightful" may be described as follows: - collecting books, preaching the Gospel to crowds of healthy, vigorous men; the next, preparing with their own hands some soothing draught or nourishing food; for those who are languishing with disease in some lone hospital; cheering the desponding spirits with the kind attentions of "home." He related some thrilling and touching incidents of the battle-field, and hospitals which were interspersed with great interest.

After the discourse a collection was taken, the Christian Commission was taken up; the result of which, was Eight Hundred and thirty-five dollars and one cent. This sum was afterwards increased to over a Thousand Dollars.

This shows how our people appreciate the soldiers who are fighting to overthrow this accursed rebellion.
