before Richmond. Col. Jackson after being made a. Brigadier-General, was killed at the first battle of Fredericksburg ; CLOCKS, WATCHES, JEWELRY. Col. Bayard, also made a Brigadier-General, was killed at the same battle. Col. Campbell was transferred for promotion, and is now a Brigadier-General, and all the others after serving for various periods resigned. Of their successors, Col Woolworth, who succeeded Col. Magilton in the command of Col. March's Regiment, was killed in one of the recent battles near the Wilderness. Colonel Hugh McNeill, who succeeded Col. Biddle, of the Thirteenth, was killed at Antiotam. and Col. Charles F. Taylor, who succeeded Col. McNeill, was killed at Gettysburg. Every one of the regiments, except that of Col. Sickels, has had at least two Colonels, and some of them three. At the date of the last official returns before us the commanding officers stood as follows :

providing for the organization of a Reserve Corps, to consist of thirteen regiments of infantry, one regiment of cavalry and one regiment of artillery. The whole was placed under the direction and command of Major-General Geo. A. McCall, and in accordance with the law were placed in camps of instruction at Easton, Westchester, Harrisburg and days' battles' were, 3074, at Fredericks-Pittsburg. It was not long, however, before the neccssities of the General Government required that two of the regiments should be sent to the field, and on the 22d of June, 1861, the regiments of Col. Charles J. Biddle (Buektails,) and Col. Seneca G. Simmons, together with two companies of artillery, under Capt. Campbell, were marched to Cumberland, Maryland, where they did excellent service on the line of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, at New Creek, Piedmont and elsewhere.
