Letter from the 195th Regiment. CAMP MONOCACY,

Monocacy Junction, Aug. 2d. 64. orders came to draw two day's rations, strike tents, and be ready to march. All was new commotion, and preparation, and in an hour's time we were on our march for Baltimore. The night was warm and the march being a protty quick one was pretty hard on new men, and all were glad when the word halt was heard, and we had reached Camden Station. I .e gagons not having arrived, the men quartered in the streets and slept soundly on the hard pavements until morning. About ten o'clock on Saturday we took the cars for Relay Station, and arrived there about noon. Pitched ten's in an open field near the rail road and by evening were again ordered to be ready to march at a moment's notice; we again drew an extra supply of rations and an increase of twenty rounds of ammunition, making in all sixty rounds. This began to look like some work, and the men began speculating upon the probabilities of a battle; however all were satisfied to move wherever needed and all were ready to do their duty. On Sunday morning we left for Monocacy, in an open truck train, with a burning sun falling upon us, and about four o'clock we arrived here, being seven hours on the road. Here we heard of the rebel raid into Pennsylvania, and all were anxious to be sent after the raiders, but it was ordered otherwise and of course we had to obey. We are now encamped on part man.
