THE SPEAKER began by contrasting life and death. Death is a sacred thing. To the good all seems good. To appreciate death is not to look at the corpse, but look at it through Christ. Before the death of Christ it was a curse, but since he died it is a reward that we do all things, "who would live always." God has prepared a passage for us and means to call us there.

THE DEAD have their existence as much now as they ever do. Every corpse is a text from God. Death is to teach us the transitory state of this life. To mourn over this state is cruel. When we look upon the dead it should bring to our mind that we are only transitory beings. If there was no death what could give solemnity to life. God teaches us tenderness in death, especially among relatives. What the prospect is no sympathy exists, but the reality befall them and they become firmly united. Social intercourse at times is a severe trial. By death he forces us to look up to him. We are fit for life but cannot pass through death without agony, but the righteous man need not fear death. These men met their death for a cause, not upon a natural bed, but in the prosecution of American principles, that which is to make man more manly, no distinction among us, giving no cause of offense, education, schools everywhere, no weapons but the tongue and sword, free speech, common interests, &c., for the promotion of such ideas they gave their lives as a sacrifice upon the altar of their country. They preach to us peculiar truths.

MULTIPLY and increase speak, present and describe these truths and feel that they are worth living for. No one can fight with-out a good spirit and love these things in their own hearts. Life, liberty and pursuit of happiness is the American motto. Do to every man what you would have others do to you—that is liberty. We must extend our ideas or we can never come up to the American spirit. We cannot reach liberty until we do these things. We should not quarrel, that is not the American spirit but once to every man in the spirit principles you have yourself. No one should pray for our soldiers to come home. You and I have a duty to do by tolerating the American spirit. Men have expressed sentiments better suited to Europe than America. To gain them a kind and loving spirit must be exhibited, and it can be accomplished, although they have different sentiments. If they died, then should we not propagate these ideas in a good spirit and that all may talk about it. After we come to the end there is no chance for improvement. We ought so to live that we will not have to look back with regret over our past life. We are engaged in trilling things and do not look to heaven or regard our life. We all have the privilege to go through it as it were, dancing. Shall we not lift our eyes from these bodies, and depart with a fixed determination, hereafter to improve our lives?

STREET GUTTERS.—Dary Crockett used to say, "be sure your right and then go ahead." This distinguished personage did not picture the result of an opposite course but left us to infer that he spoke from experience if not by authority, and although it is quoted by the vulgar it possesses more merit than many other phrases, written by ancient philosophers and which have been quoted so often by the learned as to have become classic in the history of the world.

THE GRAVE for the gutter along Front, and between Locust and Walnut, appears to have been established at some former period of the world, probably when they had gins, so as to make it two feet deep at the corner of Walnut and Front, and the result is that some six inches of mud has to be shoveled out some three or four times a year. The excuse for maintaining this nuisance, is that the grade is slight, and that water will run down hill. I concede that both these reasons are true, but I believe if the gutter was perfectly level and only one inch deep, that the inhabitants of Front street would keep it swept out as clean as their pavements; if they did not it could never get more than full; and one inch of mud is preferable to six, especially in dog days. Whenever it is convenient I would recommend that our City Fathers establish the one inch depth for mud and fill up this ditch, for it can be called a gutter in its present shape.
