The lot joins the east end of Sharpsburg, and embraces within its limits the rock upon which Gen. Lee stood wailst directing the operations of the rebel army during the memorable conflict. A large force of laborers are at present engaged in leveling and beautifying the ground, and by early Spring it will be ready, it is thought, for the final interment of the

sleeping dead. It is hoped that the States which have as yet, made no appropriation for the Cemetery, will do so during the coming winter, in order that the work may be completed as speedily as possible. All or nearly all, the loyal States will be represented in it, and it is due the memory of those who sacrificed their lives on the alter of their country, that each State lend a helping hand towards embellishing and keeping green the spot which contains the mortal remains of their honored sous .- Examiner, Frederick, Md.
