Sur-ratt has at last commenced, and the jury empanneled therefor is composed of twelve of our most respectful and reliable citizens. The, United States, in their opening speech this morning indicate their inten-tion to prove the conspiracy of the prisoner with soort the assassin. The counsel for Surratt have not yet foreshadowed the line of defende they will adopt, but it is general-ly supposed they will endeavor to prove an *alibi*: to do this will require strong evidence as the prisoner has been recognized by one of the 'prosecuting witnesses as one whom he seen in front of the theater, on the night of the murdei, and who announced to the others the time of night. In the evening the exhibition was held in the Lecture Room of the School House, and was an entire success on the part of the children and in the attendance of the citizens. The sight of the little ones. touched all hearts; every one seemed glad to be able to do something for them. Had there been five hundred children we believe they would have been provided for. Numbers were disappointed in not obtaining some of the children. The Managers of the Home are very grateful for the welcome extended to them and their little ones.

LOOK TO YOUR CELLARS .- Those who have in charge the care of the bousehold should frequently think of their cellars, and though they may not be often exposed to the eyes of strangers, take care that they are always kept in a cleanly condition, free from annoyances and muisances of all kinds. A tidily kept cellar has much to do with the health of a family, especially in the spring of the year, or wherever " heaters" are introduced into houses. No vegetables except pointoes, should be stored in the cellar. Especially should cabbages, brefs, celery, and turnips, be excluded. All these are offensive in themselves and injurious to health, while at the same time they are all preserved in a much superior manuer out of doors. A cellar should be thoroughly whitewashed at least once a year, and swept and put in order twice a month.

The air in a property kept cellar will not become impure when the weather becomes 'sufficiently cold to render necessary the closing up of the open windows; while on the other hand, the air of a cellar, so closed •up, which is untidily kept, and filled with vegetable, some of them in a decayed state, may well be imagined. All cellurs, however, should have the outside doors thrown open for an hour or two in mid-day, upon clear days, when the temperature is above the freezing point and freezing and the freezing point and the freez
