DICKENS TWADDLE. The first visit of Dickens, says the Brooklyn Standard, was the occasion of much humiliating flunkeyism. His second coming is marked by a vast amount of twaddle. Since the laying of the Atlantic Cable many absurd dispatches have been sent over the wire, but probably nothing more ridiculous than the paragraph from a London Times editorial, complimenting the Americans on their "magnanimous" treatment of the novelist. It is impossible to explain the reference to magnanimity except on the presumption that Dickens has heretofore said or done something offensive to the people of this country. Conceding the point argumentatively, what did the Times anticipate? Did it expect us to mob, or tar-and-feather and rail-ride him? Has the Times yet to learn that this is a civilized nation? America has grown old enough in a quarter of a century, to permit real or imaginary affronts on the part of individuals, to pass with no less dignified emotion than silent contempt. Should a man, remarkably gifted in the art of standing onhis head, appear in this city, people would go and see and perhaps applaud him, although he were known to have unfavorably criticised "this blasted country." Julien, of the monster orchestra; the immaculate necktie, the spotless vest, and the buffoon's mannerisms, was understood to have spoken invidiously of the public of the United States, but his concerts were not for that reason less enjoyed by large audiences. So when Dickens exhibits himself to curious crowds as the author of popular novels, good order will be maintained, wholly independently of his friendliness or unfriendliness to our republican institutions. If Beecher writes a stupid novel, Greeley a dull and egotistic autobiography, Bryant sleepy poems, and Everett rhetorical platitudes, for the New York Ledger, not for fame or because it is creditable to contribute to the Cobb organ, but because its proprietor pays large sums for the literary service, why should not Dickens read? We don't suppose Dickens himself thinks he is a good reader. He is in fact the worst we can recall. But

he is not going from city to city now to make a reputation. He relies—and safely, on his books for that. He is simply after money, and if people choose to give it for a sight of him, it is nobody else's business Talk about art and its degradation is out of order-just as it would, be had Dickens instead of reading added himself to Bar-num's collection and stood by the side of the fat woman and the living skeleton, labelled "Boz." It is impossible to raise his reading to an artistic level. When we would consider Dickensartistically we must turn to his inimitable books. One more form of twaddle is found in the notices of the press. There is probably not a journalist who has heard Dickens who does not know, his reading is beneath criticism.
