Government : the Eastern members of ongress, fogether with those from Pennsylvania, held a caucus and agreed to support the following resolution, which offered by Mr. Goodhue, a member from Massachusettes, on Thursday, the 3d uny of september, 1639;

A Resolved, That the parmanent seat of the General Government ought to be in some convenient place on the east bank of the river Susquehanna, in the State of Pennsylvania; and that until the necessary buildings be creeted for the purpose, the seat of Government ought to continue at the city of Now. York.
