POTATOES -The high price of potatoes, which have become so important an article of food, should, induce farmers to plant largely of them the present season. The potato rot is evidently the great cause of heir scarcity. It is important therefore, that farmers should guard against it. This can be done by the proper application of lime.

A writer in the Dauphin Register says that heapplied lime to his potato crop thoroughly last year, and lost none by the rot, while his neighbors all around him lost heavily. He applied lime in the hills and rows before dropping the potatoes, at the rate of a large double-handful to each hill, and thinks that if more were used it would do no injury. He thinks that potatoes should be planted deep, and cultivated without being hilled. If any one doubts this experience, let him try the experiment for himself.
