He died about ten minutes after falling. Upon an examination by Dr. H. E. Raub, his neck was found to be dislocated. Mr. Rinier was a very sober, industrious and inoffensive man. He leaves a wife and four children to mourn his loss, besides several sons and a daughter, the children of a former wife.
