TEST OF HOSE .- The new hose purchased for the Columbia Fire Company was put to a fair test on Wednesday, afternoon, at Locust street wharf, and we learn gave entire satisfaction to the Committee. It seems there was some distatisfaction with the hose on a former trial on account of there being some worm holes in the leather through which the water leaked. but these were triffing and were repaired and upon the testimony of two experienced tanners, the leather was pronounced oak tanned, and of as good a quality as could be obtained anywhere. The maker of the hose, Mr. Greer, of Philadelphia, was present and witnessed itlie test, and hescertainly had the satisfaction of seeing his work prove to be as represented. The hose were guarranteed to stand a water pressure of one hundred and fifty pounds to the square ingh, and after a fair trial with the whold line of three hundred feet, they stood the pressure to the satisfaction of all who witsed the trial. There was, however, one section in which there appeared to be a cut near the rivots, from which there appeared ome danger of a break. Mr. Greer, however, was willing to have, the whole line tested with as much pressure as could be put on until the diffective section would break. This was done and the damaged section gave way at a pressure of two hun dred and twenty pounds, seventy pounds above the guarantee, the rest of the line standing the pressure without the least sign of giving way. This was certainly a most thorough test, and proved beyond doubt the good quality of Mr. Greer's. The Coumbia boys need no more complain of ad hose, and, will now be fully equipped for effective service against the fiery ele-ment; and will do good service when needed. We trust Council will provide each of our fire companies with these leathers hose, which are certainly all that any one can desired Mr. Welchans, of Lancaster, who was present, and who has had some considerable knowledge of hose, gave his opinion that these hose are the best that can be farmished. One company in Lanaster has used Mr. G.'s hose for two years and would not sell them now for cost With plenty good, hose, and two steamers we shall be well prepared for fires in the future.
