Sex.-For the benefit of those interested in the agricultural column of your paper, Lam happy to say that the abundant crop of Canada thistles which flourished along the Chestnut Hill turnpike was carefully harvested at noon to-day. They grew along the East, side of the road for a dozen panels, or a hundred feet, South from the reservoir. For half a dozen summers, about the first of August, I have had them cut down and hoed out, but they still re-appear on the same spot where they have grown for fifteen years; but it is curious and encouraging to know that though so impossible to destroy, they have not increased in extent—not one of them has appeared on the Western side of the turnpike only thirty feet away, in all this time.

Thursday evening the 16th day of July, a child about six weeks old, was found upon the ground near Geise's Spring, a short distance below Wrightsville. Sanuel, Auble, observed it just in time to prevent some hogs from destroying it. He took it to a Mrs. Johnson, who got the Directors of the Poor of York county, to place it in her charge. She brought it to St. Peter's Catholie Church, in this place, some days ago, and had it bantized. She has manifested great interest in and affection for it., . From information obtained by Justice Evans of this place, yesterday, he caused the arrest of Martha Gohn, of this place, who proved to be the mother. In default of bail, she was committed to the Lancaster prison to await a requisition from the au thorities of York county. The case of tho defendant is a hard one, abandoned by her husband and friends, she has for some time been in very destitute circumstances, and numble to obtain employment because she had a small child. Her father too, has been sick and dependant upon her for support In ther desperation she dileges, that she abandoned it. When the child was brought to the Justice's office, where she confronted it—a mother's affection returned—and she begged most piteously for her child. FIRE. — Destruction of F. S. Bletz's Planing Mill and Carpenter Shop.—On Sunday afternoon last, our citizen's were aroused by the ringing of bolls and the cry of fre! fire!!! "The firemen with their engines and hose carriages, soon came whirling down the streets at'a fearful rate; then not knowing exactly the locality of the fire. But it soon proved to be Bletz's planing mill and carpenter shop, situated at the lower end of town, and adjoining the Columbia' Gas Works. The fire Durned with great rapidity, and before the engines got to work, the buildings were nearly destroyed. For a time the fire looked threatening and fear-ful. The brick stable adjoining the gas works, and the warehouse and lumber on the opposite side of the pike, and the house occupied by Mr. McLaughlin, were all on fire. The Columbia Steam Fire Engine took a position on the! whatfand drew her supply of water from the Susquehanna and commenced playing on the fire just in time o save a great destruction of property. Ten minutes more, the warehouse and lumber yards would have been destroyed. Wennever. saw an' engine work better or more steady. It threw a tremendous heavy and destructive stream, which proved very effective wherever it went showing condusively that the steam fire engine is the hing at a great fire. The Vigilant, at first, took position on the Susquehanna and threw the first water, but afterwards took a more rightful position in the yard of the gas works, and recieved twater from the-cistern of the holder. They done effective execution, and to them belongs the credit of saving the Columbia Gas Works. Probably thousands of : dollars were here saved he company by the herculean efforts of the Vigilant boys. The fine brick stable adjoining, was already in a blaze in several places, which was receiving a steady stream from the Vigilant, while the boys might here been seen all over the burning building, some with axes, cutting away the roof, and others with buckets of water. Afterward the Columbia succeeded in getting an additional stream into the stable, which as-

sisted in quenching the devouring element at the same time bursting a portion of their gum hose. Great credit is due to our fire-men. They all worked manfully. The planing mill and shop were a total loss. The loss of the gus company is but trifling, \$125,1 will cover: it. Mr. Bletz's loss is about \$12,000, and we believe, amply insured in the Lycoming and Columbia In-surance Companies. The fire took place in-the capenter shop, and its origin is unknown. Some say it was set on fire by some boys. All the tools belonging to the curpenters were destroyed, and some of them very valuable sets; '/A lot of tobacco, agricultural implements, dressed lumber, doors, sashes, &c., were also destroyed. Our citizens now see the necessity of good fire apparatus. At will be a saving of mony, ultimately, to secure another good steam fire engine, immediately: - Let all good citizens, property owners and business men enerally, assist the Vigilant Fire Company a their effort to procure a steam fire en-

ine. With new and substantial hose and another steam engine, incalculable benefits would be derived in time of fires. We urge upon our enterprising and prosperous citizens the importance of having a well regulated and well equiped fire department. At the same time we are decidedly opposed to disposing with the Susquebanna engine It is one of the best of the kind in the State and we'll keep her for the good she has done-she will yet render effective service at any great fire, as was the case at this one. But let us have a steamer for the Vigilant, and that immediately. With two steam engines and plenty of good hose, we will be, in a measure, proof against any conflagration. Another reason for securing an additional steam fire engine, is the nawillingness of a large majority of our citizens to assist the fire department at fires. The steamer is a labor saving machine, and the lazy can have the privilege of gazing in "beautiful stupidity" upon the devouring element, without offering to assist or accepting an invitation when tendered. A fire is terribly grand, we confess—it is thrilling-transfixing one, almost to the earth in wonderful amazement; but justice to a suffering fellow-man, and the com-monest dictates of humanity, compel us each to do all in our power to afford relief to one another.
