Clerk of the House.—Edward M'Pherson, of Pennsylvania. The Hon. Edward McPherson who was on the 4th inst. elected Clerk of the House of Representatives for the fourth time is an efficient and popular officer of respectable talents and attainments. He was born at Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, July 31, 1831, and is of Scotch-Irish extraction. In the section of the State where Mr. McPherson was born and still resides the Scotch-Irish element has always had a preponderating influence, especially in social and political life; and while it cannot he said that he owes his present position to any question of derivative nationality the unaspiring instincts of his "Pennsyl-vania Dutch" neighbors left him a free field in his earlier struggles which was of inestimable advantage. He was educated at Pennsylvania College, an institution under the charge of the Lutheran Church situated upon the field of Gettysburg and occupied by the Rebel forces as an observatory during the memorable struggle.

Mr. McPherson graduated in 1848. [Came to Lancaster in 1851 and edited the Union, a paper which advocated progressive ideas, and was the representative of that portion of the Whig party known as "Wooly heads." There was at that time existing in this county a very bitter feeling between the "silver greys," the conservative wing of the Whig party, led by Isaac E. Hiester, and the "wooly heads," led by the late Hon. Thaddeus Stevens." The excitement caused by the murder of William Smith, a fugitive slave, in Columbia, by Ridgley of Baltimore, and the part taken by District Attorney Thompson, Gov. Bigler and others to screen the murderer, led to a very bitter feeling between the wings of the party. Mr. McPherson took the side of the murdered slave, and endeavored to have justice meted out to the murderer, but was balked by the officers of the law .- ED.

SPY.7 In 1858 he was elected to the XXXVIth Congress, from the Sixteenth Pennsylvania District, and was re-elected to the XXXVII Congress, but in 1852, though again the candidate of the Republican party he was defeated by a small majority. For a few years previous to his election to Congress he had devoted himself to agricultural pursuits, and by a somewhat anomalous juxtaposition of duties found himself in the House on the Committee on Naval Affairs during the first session, and a member of the Military Committee through his second term. In 1862, when, for a short time previous to the battle of Antietam, Pennsylvania was threatened with invasion, he served on the staff of Major-Gen. Reynolds, subsequently killed at Gettysburg: He was appointed Dep-uty Commissioner of the Internal Revenue 1863, and on the meeting of the XXXVIIIth Congress, he was elected Clerk of the House of Representatives, being subsequently elected to the same position in the XXXIXth and XLth Congresses. Mr. McPherson is a gentleman of fine literary culture, and besides two series of letters touching the internal affairs of his native State, written previous to his entry upon public life, he has delivered many addresses on different occasions. In 1864 he published a valuable compend entitled "The Political History of the United States during the Great and this work mented with a volume for the year 1866. During his last term in Congress he was a Regend of the Smithsonian institution. It is said that he is now engaged in the preparation of a life of the late Thaddeus Stevens, with whom he enjoyed the most intimate and friendly relations for many years. He is one of the executors name in the will of Mr. Stevens, as is also Mr. Dickey, who fills the "Old Commoner's" place in Congress, and on whose nomination Mr. McPherson was accepted by the Republican caucus for the Clerkship of the House. Mr. McPherson married a daughter of the Rev. Dr. Smucker, for many years the leading professor in the theological seminary at Gettysburg, and enjoys a distinction few men of his years can boast, having been made an LL. D. by Pennsylvania College in 1867. He is one of the proprietors and editors of The Gettysburg Sentinel newspaper, has many friends and a few enemies, and leads a

Dens of New York. The commissioner of the N. Y. World recently made an inspection of some of the low lodging houses of that city. He found that in that part of Greenwich street situated in the First ward near the Battery, no less than fifty cellars are leased by as many ruffians, who take in lodgers at from five to fifteen cents each per night. On Sun-day night thirty-four persons of both sexes lay huddled there on the bare floor. A red-hot stove generated such heat that the lodgers were compelled to strip off most their clothing. A sluggish drain from the privy in the rear coursed immediately beneath the planks, and sent its effluvia up through the yawning crevices. Vermin swarmed noisomely everywhere, murdering sleep and provoking obscene anathemas from their writhing human victims, whose thirty-four half-naked bodies exhaled a stench that rivalled the mephitic odors of the drain. Even if the atmosphere had been ordinarily pure, each pair of lungs in the place would have had only ninetyfour cubic feet of oxygen to breathe, or less than one-eighth of the quantity requisite for a night's healthy slumber. But, the fetor was so overpowering as to sicken those who were unused to it in a few seconds; and the inmates acclimatized as they were, lay as if in a kind of stupor. "A pigeon," said one of the physicians who ventured into the den on . Saturday night, "would be comatose here in twenty
