This is done by using intense heat from pulverised fuel with crude powdered ores and the proper fluxes. Bar steel can thus be made in one-eighth the usual time and at fifty per cent. less cost.

A GREAT war seems inevitable in Europe at no distant day. It will be extremely difficult, if not impossible, to prevent England drifting into it; and in that event, unless we make such stipulations in the settlement of the Alabama claims as will restrict us from sending out from our neutral ports war vessels to prey upon the commerce of the beligerents, we will be able to settle our disputes with England upon our own terms. These facts' are inducing a growing sentiment in this country that it is wise not to be in a hurry about the settlement of the Alabama

The White Pine District. Persons who may be thinking of emi-

grating to this region on account of the glowing descriptions of the enormous yield of silver from the mines, would do well first to study the following statement by a San Francisco paper, of the prices -which are paid in the White Pine District for staple articles: Lumber, from \$250 to \$300 per 1000; hay, \$300 per ton; bar-ley, 15 cents per pound; flour, \$16 per cwt.; bacon, 45 cents; salt pork, 40 cents; beans, 28 cents; sugar, 35 cents; coffee, 70 cents, tea, \$150 per pound; butter, \$1; cheese, 40 cents; rice, 38 cents, fresh meats, from 20 to 40 cents; sausage, 50 cents; lard, 35 cents; board per week, \$15; lodgings, \$1 per night.

A Self-Propelling Velocipede. A decided improvement in the velocipede has been invented and is now being applied by a Cincinnati gentleman. The propelling principle consists of a mainspring, similar to that in a watch. After winding it up, it is calculated to run two miles before it will require re-winding. The rider will thereby be relieved of the labor of working it with his feet which even the most enthusiastic velocipedist will admit, becomes a little tedious after running, say fifty miles over a rough road and ascending a good many steep hills. You can wind up your machine and start off at once on your travels, and when you preceive that your motive power is becoming exhausted, take your key and wind it up again without dismounting or stopping.

The Queen of England-Rer Public and Private Life. A corespondent of the Doston South As a BALTIMORE COMPANY, LYKENS VALLEY, Sovereign she is the hardest woman in England. Her official duties usually commence at seven o'clock in the morning, one hour before breakfast. Whereever she is dispatches are sent daily in by messengers, who ride in first-class cars bearing what are called baskets. The papers from all the Departments are submitted to her. The baskets are dark morocco boxes about a foot in length. These are sent from Downing street, the Admiralty, the Home Department, the Head of the Army, &c. Each box is locked by the Minister who sends it. A card hanging from the inside contains the name of the Minister. Every train to Winsdor, Balmoral and Osborne, carries messengers with these boxes... The Queen and the Minister alone can unlock them. All these documents have to be read, for she signs nothing which she does not read. Every bill, act, treaty, document, petition or paper requiring her name, are subject to her personal attention. Her Majesty is admitted to be one of the best business women in the kingdom. Each day's business is finished before the day closes. ". Usually the mes senger waits and takes the basket; locked by her Majesty back to the Minister from whom it came. The Queen holds a ready pen and carries on her personal correspondence which is very large. She pays her own postage like any lady in the land.
