The Internal Revenue Record says that a number of grocers, in different parts of the country, have got into trouble through inattention or through ignorance of their obligations, under the revenue laws, with regard to articles liable to stamp. For the information of all such, we would state that sardines, anchovies, prepared mustard, syrups in bottles, jams, jellies, meat and fish sauces, colognes, cosmetics, &c., are liable to stamp duty, whether made in the United States or imported. The stamp must be affixed on each article offered or exposed for sale. Sardines, anchovies, sauces, syrups, prepared mustard, jams and jellies, are subject to stamp according to the weight of each package; a one cent stamp if the package does not exced two pounds in weight, and a stamp of an additional cent for every pound or fraction of a pound in excess of two pounds in weight.
