The idea of incorporating, among the other objects of the G. A. R. Association, the plan of Life Insurance, is one that is vrey characteristic of the ultilitarian tendency of the American mind. The G.A. R. was organized, in the first place, merely for the preservation of army recollections, and the esprit du corps of the disbanded Union Army. Out of this grew the necessity of assisting the destitute widows and orphans of soldiers. Great good has been done in this way by the society. but in a loose and desultory manner. It was proposed at Cincinnati, the other day, that they should systematize their charity, and care not only for the soldiers' widows and orphans, but for those who will yet be widows and orphans in the course of time. The idea took, and doubtless this great organization -- whose ramifications extend throughout every loyal State and territory, and a good many rebel ones, whose posts are numbered by thousands, whose members by hundreds of thousands, and whose charities of the State of Illinois alone, amounted last year to over \$12,000-this great organization will become a grand Co-operative Life Insprance Company.—Pittsburg Dispatch.

The Ingurance Business. The New York Times has been expesing what it calls the prevailing extravagance in the life insurance management. It alleges that much higher rates are required of insurers than there is any necessity for, by reason of the very evpensive salaries and exorbitant commissions that are paid in the competition for business; and risks are carelessly taken which must make it all the worse for those who are better entitled to insurance." It calls attention to the fact also that the fire underwriters are dissatisfied with the management of their branch of the business, having discovered that in the reckless race for business they have suffered rates of commission to raise to a point which jeopardizes the solvency of companies, and is productive of evils which should be summarily suppressed. The result of this discovery, the Times tells us, has been a resolution on the part of the most respectable companies to reduce to a moderate and uniform standard the rates of commission paid to agents and brokers. This reduction may have the effect to diminish the volume of business, but the temporary loss in this respect will be more than recovered by the improved condition of the business, and its improved title to public
