New Volume of Dickens. Hurd and Houghton have added a vol ume to their four editions of Dickens's Works, which is unique in character, and completes the various sets. It is called "Master Humphrey's clock," taking its name from the first and largest portion of the volume. It may be remembered that Mr. Dickens commenced in 1840 the publication of a serial work under the above title. Master Humphrey was the principal character—an old gentleman of a prattling turn of mind, who acted as a sort of chairman of an antiquated club, whose meetings were held under the shadow of ed to, a his tall clock, out of the case of which came manuscript rolls of stories. Mr. Pickwick reappears, and so do Sam Weller and his father, and even a third Weller in the person of Sam's small son Tony, who is a miniature likeness of his grandfather; and very early, under the tuition of that patriarch, displays an interest in piats and quarts. Who can keep in his head the number of the street where each resides? Last of all is a curious list of Familiar Sayings from Dickens's Works, which illustrates well the indebtedness of the world to this master of felicitous phrases.
