LARGE AND DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN YORK, PA .- A fire broke out in York, about one o'clock Tuesday morning, in the warehouse occupied by Mr. Weaver, in which was stored a large quantity of government goods consisting of blankets blouses, pantaloons, shoes, &c., entirely consuming the building together with contents. The fire communicated to several adjacent buildings, the first a frame stable belonging to Thomas, Chambers & Co., which was also burned to the ground; a horse perished in the flames. From this the warehouse of Emanuel King caught, and a large quantity of phosphate stored in the building; exploded, with a loud report, throwing the firey element in all directions This building was also totally destroyed. Next adjoining two frame dwelling houses belonging to Philip Stair which also caught fire and despite all efforts to save, burned down. A lumber yard in the vicinity sustained considerable loss. The fire is thought to be the work of an incendiary.

Mn. Entron:—Almost all writers on the great political art of forming national character, agree in recognizing the fine arts as one of the numerous means of attaining such results, as fare desired by those who wish well-to the State. It is the provided of the State of the Community of our public schools, but generally, with no higher object than the merely practical advantages derived therefrom. Nevertheless, we find, every now and then, a man who looks beyond this mere mercenary end, to the object first mentioned—the noulding of character. Children who find pleasure in drawing, seldom give their parents or the community at large, much trouble through their rudeness, and artists are proverbially refined. In addition to these considerations, those who cultivate art for the love of it, have, within their souls, a pure fountain of exhaustless delight. The vocation of the skill/tul drawing-master must become one of the permanent parts of our system of public instruction. And it is a loss to the community when feat talent is allowed tem of public instruction. And it is a loss to the community when real talent is allowed to remain unemployed. This is true of all departments of life, and is certainly not less

true of genius in the sphere of art than else-where.

What I have written is merely by way of introduction for the name of Lloyd Minlin, Jr., of Columbia, who, endowed with an hereditary love of art, and born and bred in the midst of scenery surpassing in beauty much in the old world that the poet and painter have made famous, (to say nothing of inforior American scenery which is much more widely celebrated than ours,) has acquired unusual skill, for one so true of genius in the sphere of art than elsehas acquired unusual skill, for one so young in the field of landscape-painting; and is devoting himself with great assiduity to his favorite pursuit, with very perceptible increase of discrimination, as to the truly benutiful. truly benutiful.
