Whether this bas, been from bad management, delects in the machinery, or lack of business enterprise, we can not say but that there is money to be made out o this mill, if properly run, there is no doubt, for no better locality for a mauufacturing establishment of this kind can be found in Columbia We had hoped long since, some more enterprising parties would have pur ohased this establishment and put it in goo order, and not only given employment to from three to four hundred men, but added to the wealth of its owners and the interests of our town; We need more factories if we expect our town to improve, but we cannot expect to entice strangers to Columbia to build them for us, when we have one of the largest and best in our town standing idle more than balf the time. There is capital enough in Columbia, properly/employed, to make the town half again as large and prosperous as it now is, but it is sad to see our largest Rolling Mill going to min for the want of sufficient nerve, or enterprise, Can not some of our monied men make arrangements.whereby this property so valuable to the town, can be put in order and run to its fall capacity, or influence the present owner to equip and put in operation the Columbia Rolling Mill. Other towns all around us are building factories of various kinds, while Columbia looks on in wonder at the increasing prosperity of our sister, towns.
