way we asked him "what he was doing." "I am going to enlarge my young orchard." he replied, "and plant some more choice varieties. If my farm should ever be in the market, L calculate every row of trees will in crease its value a thousand dollars. We passed on, but this remark "set us to thinking.". Now there is not a practical farmer n the State who will not admit the truth of this, in theory if not in practice..... But aside from orchard trees, we wonder if there is attention enough paid to the planting of shade trees around our farms and about our dwellings. ; We don't nean-to-smother-your-houses in eloselyplunted perennials, shutting out all the blessed sun shine, darkening the windows, dampening the walls, making each a consumptive breeder. Try to strike the happy medium between this and you mansion over the way, standing out in bold relief against the sky, without one friendly branch to relieve its dazzling whiteness. This togethwith the fine farm attached, has been for some time in market, and the owner has lately gone to the expense of having it

newly planted, as an extra inducement to purchäsers.' ' Here is one instance: Last week a wealthy gentleman from the city with a view to purchase, examined it carefully and then said "I like your farm, your house is a good one, and your price is not unreasonable; but it would not seem like iving in the country unless I have shade And thus saying he departed to " look

Apart from beauty and utility, I tell you friend, it "will be a matter of dollars and cents to you, if you will plant that lane leading from the main road to your dwelling, with thrifty young trees and maples; put two or three around your dwelling and one by the door of the wood-shed It will be very little trouble and will please the eye as well as gratify the faste, besides you will realize much pleasure from the shade. Then exercise your mechanical ingenuity and construct a neat little arbor over the kitchen door, and plant a woodbine to train over it. Let there be plenty of grape-vines-planted in the garden, and in a few years at best we can each of us take our siesta under our "own vines and shade tree."

Deep Ploughing. About the propriety of this much has been said and many theories advanced. How to Save Corn Fodder Much of the value of cornestover is lestroyed by 'carcless' handling, even in the districts where they store it for feed. The curing process goes on safely while it remains in the shock, but husking begins while the stalks are yet green at the bottom, and the fodder is immediately stacked or carried to the barn, and stored in bulk. It soon heats and mould. If, after husking, the stalks are bound immediately in bundles, of convenient size for handling, and put into large shocks of thirty or forty bundles, set up endwise, and capped with straw, they will cure without moulding, and make excellent

fodder. Infallible Recipes. To remove freckles, cut them out with a razor and throw them away. To bring out a . moustache,; . tie it to a strong : cord twenty feet long, to the other end of which attach a heavy smoothing-iron, and throw the latter from a forth, story, window. To get rid of red hair, hold your head for a few minuts in a strong blaze of gas. To preserve your eyes, put them in a bottle filled, with alcohol lor.
