

### Ten Licenses Granted.

Messrs.—In looking over the records of Dec. Term of Quarter Session, in Bradford County, Penna., I find that ten individuals were licensed to sell liquor in small quantities, i. e.—I suppose by the drink. Although very strong remonstrances were brought against some, Judge Wilcox, Ballard, and Ackley gave permission. This accounts for the necessity of twelve weeks court in a year, besides numberless arbitrations. Much of the 2d week was occupied in *caulding* some poor fellows for selling without license. And the Court said to the licensed ones, "If you sell to known, and habitual drunkards, your licenses will be suspended, or revoked."—The same as saying, you may manufacture as many drunkards as you please, you may bring all the treasures of learning and talent, with the bright prospects of peace and happiness, to an untimely, and dishonored grave. You may sell the poison to the young man, who is the pride of his aged parents—their stay—their all, whose clear and lofty mind, like the cedar of Lebanon, will make him eminent in society. Yes, you may poison his mental and physical powers, but you must not intrude your poison upon the old drunkard who has long lain in the ditch, and whose character, property and all, long ago passed into oblivion. So much for regulating the liquor traffic. What a pity that those gentlemen had not lived in France to regulate their houses of licentiousness, or in ancient Sparta, where theft was no crime, if not detected. Those ten licensed houses will pay into the County fund \$120; but how much will they take out? Look at the long trial list, and see ten or fifteen criminal cases at every Court, and more civil suits than can be contained in one column of their County paper. "A penny wise and pound foolish" policy. The exact sum received in the City and County of Philadelphia for tavern licenses in the year 1851, was \$66,202. The expenses for prosecuting for crime, and for the support of pauperism consequent on intemperance, in the City and County, was, for the same year, \$366,000.—*Says* Albert Barnes: "Should an evil like this be protected by law, should it be assumed that it is to exist, should an attempt be made merely to regulate it, should it have the patronage of the State and be made legal, should a virtuous community consent to be taxed to sustain it, should intelligent and pious men lend their countenance to it?" We say no. Society has the right to protect itself, and by no means should pass laws to protect evil. Instead of regulating evil, why not remove it? "What would a government be that should undertake to regulate murder?" As the citizens of Bradford are engaged in an uphill business, would it not be best for the "banner county" to send them a missionary? They ought to know how nicely we get along without licensed houses. And as we are elevated far above them on the material globe, they should know that we are equally so in the scale of morality. Does any one doubt this? Look at last fall's election. B
