ARISTOCRACY.
The word, aristocracy, is of Grecian origin, and its original signification means, "the rule of the best," that is the rule or government exercised by the best persons. Originally, therefore, it was used in good sense. But its modern use differs materially from its original meaning. I will use it in the latter sense. It is both heartless and hateful. Its haughty frown is always so unfortunate as to rest upon its superiors in integrity and true dignity. You have no right in its estimation, except to do it homage, and acknowledge your inferiority. It is no idea that you have any rights or any feelings of self-respect, nor even a right to suppose that you are entitled to any respect, save what it condescends to confer upon you. You do not belong to the same race with your haughty aristocrat. You cannot associate with him, when in his company; for he will not associate with you. He does not regard you as a fellow partner in interest with himself. He merely makes use of you in the same sense that a man makes use of his dog. You are no more a companion to him than his dog is, and you are no more than a dog if you condescend to be of his association. He belongs to the self-styled "first families,"—first in idleness—first in haughtiness—first in the scorn and contempt of humanity. He has a great deal of affected benevolence for virtuous poverty, and even condescends to fern association with it, when he thinks there is no danger of exposure. But when honest outraged poverty happens to tread upon the toes of the aristocrat, and asserts its claims to respect, it rouses the lion in him, and he roars and shakes his mane! But aristocracy has none of the real lion in it, yet it feels bigger than a whole den of lions! It comes by opulence. It comes by family descent. But it more frequently originates in self-love or a pretty face with scarcely any more to put into it than the scanty title which a father's or husband's hard earnings can spare from the gaudy attire of the body. It can be seen in the supercilious countenance. Its nose and upper lip have an expression peculiar to themselves, as much as say, I care considerably less than nothing for you. It will turn up the nose of family descent so high as to be unable to see "common folks" as they pass by. You must beware of it. Shun it. Now I like refinement to any extent, but this uppish aristocracy, I have not the slightest respect for it. I will not treat it even courteously. Out of the way and out of the world with it.
