TEACHING READING, o. 2

It should be one of the great objects of the Teacher, to create in the mind of his pupils, a love for study, and, at the early age which most children are now sent to school, we believe the Teacher has done a good term's work, and one that is of far more worth to the schular than aught elso he can do, when he has imparted to him a love for school:

Now, under the system of teaching reading to young pupils, referred to in our last, it would be almost or quite impossible to do this. Then what shall we substitute in place thereof! Much has been said, and much written upon the "Word System;" but space nor time will admit of our giving it anything fike a thorough exposition. We believe, however, that this rule should be laid down by every-Teacher: Never attempt to teach anything that has not an idea connected with its To work upon this principle, it will be found practicable, inasmuch as it is difficult to con- trusted to him. nect an idea with a bare letter, to teach words at first. A few simple words as "boy," "play," "love," &c., will be easier taught than, a, b, e, and d; and at the same time, can be made to interest the child in what he is doing. He is at once taught to make senlences, and is no longer in the dark, as to what all the preliminaries are for. Immediately following, or attendant upon this, let him be taught to spell the simple words that his eye has learned to distinguish, and after buce showing as to the "how," of making words from letters, and of getting letters from words, he will very soon of his own accord, learn the alphabet, thus in a great measure avoiding the toil attendant upon the ordinary plan. If the idethod be judiciously tisted, there will be no lack of in crest upon the part of the pupil. And from this very interest, if nothing more, he will make a much more rapid and a far better kind of progress, than if he were compelled to go blindfold through it all. He will have accustomed his eye to know and call words by eight, which will be of very great advantage to min, and a thing which very many never

This, then, would be our plan for teaching primary reading. And so much of the "Word System" as would have the scholar learn to call all words by sight, rather than by first spellingg them, we would retain through the full cour e of reading. We would in no case above the pupir to read that which he could not get at idea from, and would at this way keep up an interest, which will be the best gu range of healthy and rapid advancement.—M'Keu.
