WILLIAMSON. PHILADELPHIA, September 8.—The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, which nated next week by the Whig is now in session here, has refused to grant the release of Passmore Williamson.

Judge Lowrie concurred in the decision, although he differed from the others in some of the views of the case. Judge Knox dissented from the

Judge Black read the decision -The ground taken is that the court has no jurisdiction to warrant its interfer-The regard to the Whig party he ing with the judgment of the federal courts; that such courts have exclusive power in deciding cases of contempt, and this court could not go behind the record to ascertain the fact whether the commitment was legal or not.

Judge Knox in his adverse opinion contends that the District Court had no jurisdiction to issue a writ of habeas corpus in the first place, and that Williamson was guilty of nocrime in refusing to answer it.

He also urges that the power to issue writs of habeas corpus is confined exclusively to state courts.
