sylvania, entitled "An Act relating to the elec-
tions of this Commonwealth," approved the
second day of July, A. D. one thousand eight
hundred and thirty-seven, and the Act, in this
respect, heretofore published in the House
of Representatives of the General Assembly of
this Commonwealth, and the Act, in this

and give notice to the electors of the county
aforesaid, that a General Election will be held
in said county of Potter on the second TUESDAY
of October, 1854, at which time state and county
officers as follows are to be elected, to-wit:
One person for Local Commissioner of the
Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
One person for member of the Senate of
Pennsylvania for the XVIIIth Senatorial
District, comprising the counties of Tioga, Potter,
McKean, Elk, Forest, Jefferson, and Clearfield.
Two persons for members of the House of
Representatives of General Assembly of Pen-
sylvania, in conjunction with the counties of
Lycoming, Johnson, and Potter, in the House
of Representatives of the General Assembly of
Pennsylvania.
One person for the office of County Com-
missioner for the county of Potter.
One person for the office of Auditor for the
county of Potter.
I also make known and give notice, as in and
directed, that every person excepting Justices
of the Peace, who is eligible to an appointment
of profit or trust under the Government of
the United States or of this state, or of any
city or independent district, whether a commis-
sioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate
officer or agent, who is or shall be employed
under the legislative, judiciary, or executive
department of this state or United States, or
of any city or incorporated district, and also
that every member of Congress and of the
state Legislature, and of the select and com-
mon council of any city, or commissioners of
any incorporated district, is by law incapable
of holding or exercising at the same office
or appointment of Judge, thepector, or Clerk
of any election in this Commonwealth, and
that no Inspector or Judge, or other officer
of any such election shall be eligible to any office
that is to be voted for.
Also, that in the fourth section of the Act of
Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to elections
and for other purposes," approved April 16th
1840, it is enacted that the aforesaid 15th
section shall not be construed as to prevent
any military officer or borough officer from
serving as Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any
general or special election in this Common-
wealth.
It is further directed that the meeting of
the return judges at the Court House in Cou-
dersport to make out the general returns, shall
be on the first Friday succeeding the general
election, which will be the 12th day of Octo-
ber.
The return judges of Tioga, Potter, McKean,
Elk, Forest, Jefferson, and Clearfield, com-
prising the XVIIIth district, will meet at the
Court House in Coudersport, on Tuesday the
16th day of October next, to make out an
official return for member of the Senate.
The return judges of Lycoming, Johnson, and
Potter counties will meet at the Court House
in Williamsport, on Tuesday the 16th day
of October next, to make out returns for mem-
bers of Assembly.
