

IMPORTANT LETTER FROM ATCHISON.

Among the letters addressed to the Committee of Invitation for the King's Mountain (N. C.) Celebration, we find the following:

PLATTE CITY, Mo., Sept. 12, 1855. GENTLEMEN: Your letter of invitation, requesting my attendance at the Celebration of the Battle of King's Mountain, has been received. It will be altogether inconvenient for me to be present on that occasion. I have certain duties, both private and public, to discharge at home. The Battle of King's Mountain was fought by the Whigs, under the lead of Campbell, McDowell, Shelby, Sevier, and Williams, against the forces under the gallant Ferguson. We have a similar foe to encounter in Kansas, on the first Monday in October next—the "border ruffians," such as fought with McDowell, Shelby, &c., on the one hand, and the Abolitionists, such men as fought with Ferguson, on the other. We (the "border ruffians") have the whole power of the Northern States to contend with, single-handed and alone, without assistance, and almost without sympathy, from any quarter; yet we are undismayed. Thus far, yet we have been victorious; and, with the help of God, we will still continue to conquer.

Gentlemen, I thank you for the kind expression in the concluding paragraph of your letter—"three cheers for Atchison and Kansas!" I have read this paragraph to sundry of the "border ruffians," and their eyes sparkle; their arms are nerved. We have been acting on the defensive altogether. The contest with us is one of life and death, and it will be so with you and your institution if we fail Atchison, Stringfellow, and the "border ruffians" of Missouri, fill a column of each Abolition paper published in the North; abuse most foul and falsehood unblushing is poured out upon us; and yet we have no advocate in the Southern press, and yet we receive no assistance from the Southern States. But the time will shortly come, when that assistance must and will be rendered. The stake the "border ruffians" are playing for is a mighty one. If Kansas is Abolitionized, Missouri ceases to be a slave State, and New Mexico becomes a free State; California remains a free State; but if we secure Kansas as a slave State, Missouri is secure; New Mexico and Southern California, if not all of it, become slave States. In a word, the prosperity or the ruin of the whole South depends on the Kansas struggle.

Your obedient servant, D. R. ATCHISON. It will be seen that Atchison fully corroborates all the charges of interference by Missourians in the affairs of Kansas. It will require a face of bronze to deny it, after reading this letter. "Thus far," he says, "have we been victorious, and, by the help of God, we will still continue to conquer." He claims it throughout the letter to be the peculiar business of Missouri to introduce slavery into Kansas; and while he complains of the abuse heaped upon the "border ruffians" by the Northern Abolitionists, he pretends not to deny the charge of interference in Kansas affairs, but justifies and glorifies it.

We must do Atchison the justice to say that this letter is creditable to his sagacity. We concur with him entirely in the opinion, that "if Kansas is Abolitionized, Missouri ceases to be a slave State, and New Mexico becomes a free State; California remains a free State; but if we secure Kansas as a slave State, Missouri is secure; New Mexico and Southern California, if not all of it, become slave States." Atchison is a coarse, hard-swearing, tobacco-chewing fellow, but he evidently knows what he is about. We trust that our readers will weigh well every word of this letter. It is full of significance. It reveals the whole plot of the Pro-Slavery party, and the motives which led to the repeal of the Missouri Compromise. It should nerve the arm of every Northern freeman to renewed efforts in behalf of Freedom in Kansas.—National Era.

To the Honorable the Judges of the Court of Quarter Sessions For the County of Potter, Penna. THE undersigned citizens of Harrison having associated themselves together for religious purposes and no other, do respectfully ask your honorable body to grant to them a charter of incorporation to enable them to build a meeting house in the town of Harrison, Potter Co. Pa., for the use of the First Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Harrison. The following are the articles of association: Article 1. The name of the association shall be the First Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Harrison.

Article 2. The names of the first trustees shall be Thomas Statham, Edwin Statham, Henry Clark, Merrill Sackett, and Nelson Gill, said trustees, to consist of three classes, Class No. 1. to go out of office one year from the act of incorporation, Class No. 2. to go out of office in two years from said act, Class No. 3. to go out of office in three years from said act, and forever afterwards one Class to be elected every year in rotation. Article 3. The Trustees to be elected in accordance with the Methodist Episcopal Discipline as far as that harmonizes with the laws of the State. Article 4. The Board of Trustees will be responsible to the Quarterly Conference of the Circuit, or station, in the county in which the property is located, and shall be required to present a yearly report of its acts to said Conference. Article 5. The amount of property owned by this association, shall not be greater than to yield a yearly income of two thousand dollars.
