4. The said corporation shall have power to make and use one common seal with such device or inscription thereon as they may deem proper, and the same to break, alter, or renew at pleasure; and also to enact and enforce such by laws and ordinances from time to time as they may deem expedient for the prosperity and good government of the said corporation, provided the same shall not be inconsistent with the Constitution or laws of the United States, nor of this State, nor with the form of discipline by which said Church is governed.

Article 3. The Trustees to be elected in accordance with the Methodist Episcopal Discipline as far as that harmonizes with the laws of the State.
