Supervisors and Township Treasurers, Take Notice.

Commissioners' Office, Coudersport, March 12, 1856.

IN conformity with the requirements of the following 6th section of the act of Assembly entitled "An act to consolidate and amend the Road laws of the counties of Tioga, Potter, McKean and Elk," passed the 14th day of April, A. D. 1855, the undersigned, Commissioners of Potter county, will meet at their office in the Borough of Coudersport, on Monday, the 20th day of May next, at which time and place, the Supervisors and Treasurers of the several townships who are desirous of drawing and receiving the orders for their respective townships, are requested to attend.

SECTION 6. That it shall be the duty of the supervisors, on or before the first day of June of each year, to file their duplicate for so much of the tax assessed upon unseated lands, in pursuance of the foregoing sections of this act, as shall at that time remain due and unpaid, in the office of the County Commissioner for collection; when the said duplicate shall have been filed as aforesaid, the county Commissioners are hereby authorized and required to draw their orders on the county treasurer, in favor of the supervisors of the proper townships, in such amount as may be desired by them, to the amount of such duplicate, deducting therefrom such amount as will, in the judgment of the county commissioners, be sufficient to pay the commission of the county treasurer, and cover such exonerations and abatements as will be likely to be made, and deliver the same to the township treasurer; the said duplicate, when so filed, shall be collected by the county treasurer, as provided by law for the collection of other taxes on unseated lands, and the tax so collected shall be paid out on the said orders drawn by the county commissioners.
