COMMISSIONERS' OFFICE, Coudersport, March 12, 1856.

IN conformity with the requirements of the following bill section of the act of Assembly, entitled "An act to consolidate and amend the Road laws of the counties of Tioga, Potter, McKean and Elk," passed the 14th day of April A. D. 1856, the undersigned, Commissioners of Potter county, will meet at their office in the Borough of Coudersport, on Monday, the 26th day of May next, at which time and place, the Supervisors and Treasurers of the several townships who are desirous of drawing and receiving the orders for their respective townships, are requested to attend. ALICE, DUCHE WHIPPLE, HENRY NELSON, CLARA, HARRISON ROSA.

Section 6. That it shall be the duty of the supervisors, or before the first day of June of each year, to file their duplicate for so much of the tax assessed upon unpatented lands, in pursuance of the foregoing sections of this act, as shall at that time remain due and unpaid, in the office of the County Commissioners for collection; when the said duplicate shall have been filed as aforesaid, the County Commissioners are hereby authorized and required to draw their orders on the county treasurer, in favor of the supervisors of the proper townships, in sums as may be due by them, (the amount of such duplicate, deducting therefrom such amount as will, in the judgment of the county commissioners, be sufficient to pay the commission of the county treasurer, and cover such exonerations and abatements as will be likely to be made, and shall defer the same to the township treasurer; the said duplicate, when so drawn, shall be collected by the county treasurer, or his provider by law for the collection of other taxes on unpatented lands, and the tax so collected shall be paid out on the said orders drawn by their respective commissioners.
