NEWSITEMS. THE FIRST GUN.

The dashing young state of Iowa was the first to bear its sovereign testimony in behalf of freedom, since the nomination of Fremont and Dayton and she has covered herself with imperishable honor. Nothing could be more complete than the victory just obtained by the Republicans, except the defeat sustained by the Buchaniers. The entire delegation in Congress. eight thousand majority for the Republican State ticket, two-thirds of the legislature, with, a control, for the first time of the State Senate' are among the crowning fruits of this great triumph.
