He also contemplates making an addition in the rear, by 20 feet, with a large hall on the second floor the whole length. He will repaint the whole front and two sides white which will make it one of the finest buildings in the village. We predict a large custom for Mr. Atwood in his New House.—The "Atwood Hotel."

A fine large buck was shot by Mr. Woodell, in the Allegheny river, at this place, on Saturday last. He had been run off the mountains by some dogs, when Mr. G. intercepted his progress with a small portion of extract of lead-mines.

H. J. Olmsted of this village has been appointed, by Hon. A. G. Curtin recording clerk in the State department. We are much gratified with his appointment, as Mr. Olmsted is one of our most worthy citizens, and a few superiors as an office clerk.

Z. F. Robinson, of Harrison Hill, has been commissioned as a lieutenant, with the rank of Col. This is an excellent appointment, and worthily bestowed.

The weather has been more than ordinarily cold during the greater part of this month, and during the last few days past there has considerable rain fallen, not enough, however, to cause any rise in the river. We had a light frost on Tuesday morning, but it did not injure the vegetables hereabouts.

NEWS ITEMS.

THE FIRST GUN.

The dashing young state of Iowa was the first to bear its sovereign testimony in behalf of freedom, since the nomination of Fremont and Dayton and she has covered herself with imperishable honor. Nothing could be more complete than the victory just obtained by the Republicans, except the defeat sustained by the Buchanians. The entire delegation in Congress, eight thousand majority for the Republican State ticket, two-thirds of the legislature, with a control, for the first time of the State Senate' are among the crowning fruits of this great triumph.

The first Congressional district, which, two years since, returned Hall, (Nebraska democrat) by an alleged majority of 179, has now sent the same Mr. Hall to private life, and has chosen a sound and reliable Republican in his place, by at least a thousand majority—the latest telegraphic report makes it fifteen hundred. The same district, in 1852, gave a majority of 727 for Pierce. The second district, which gave Pierce a plurality of 403 four years ago, has now given the Republican party a majority of four or five thousand. The state Senate, last year Nebraska, has been redeemed, while the Republican majority in the House has been largely increased.

That will do very well for a beginning. Rejoice while you may, Hoosiers of Iowa, for when the returns come in from Maine, your noble victory will, to use one of General Washington's comparisons which Mr. Sparks did not like, be but a flea-bite in comparison.—N. Y. Ev. Post.

The *Lecha Patriot*, published at Allentown Lehigh County, has hauled down the Fillmore and Donelson ticket from its mast head and hoisted in its place that of Fremont and Dayton. This is a German paper of considerable influence, in Northampton, Bucks, Carbon and Berks Counties.

The *Johantown (Pa.) Tribune*, "disappointed and chagrined at the action of the American State Convention recently held at Harrisburg, has 'dropped the names of Fillmore and Donelson,' and will throw its influence in favor of the men most likely to defeat Buchanan.

The result of the Southern elections must satisfy every man that Fillmore stands no chance at the South, which will support Buchanan—not as the most reliable, but as the most available man. The South, also, has a habit of using Northern men, and dropping them when used. They used Van Buren, and dropped him; they used Fillmore, and dropped him; they used Pierce, and dropped him. When they have out of a man all they can for slavery, they let him go. They like the treason but don't trust the traitor.—*Lewisburg Chronicle*.

THE petition of Divers persons inhabitants of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, respectfully sheweth, that Whereas the members of the First Presbyterian Church of Ulysses Township, in the County of Potter, and State of Pennsylvania, wish to be incorporated according to the articles hereunto attached, would recommend to the Honorable Court incorporate said Church accordingly, and your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray, &c.

Sec. 1st. This corporation or body politic shall be known by the name and style of the First Presbyterian Church of Ulysses, and by the same sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded in all courts of law and equity, and shall be able and capable in law and equity, to take hold and enjoy for the use of said Church such lands and tenements, goods and chattels, as are, or shall hereafter become the property of the said Church or to be held for their use, by gift, grant, devise, bequest or otherwise, from any person or persons whatsoever, capable of making the same and the same to grant bargain sell or otherwise dispose of for the use of the said Church, and congregation.

Sec. 2. That David Whipple, Jesse, Benton, A. G. Presko, G. W. Benton, and E. Merrill, shall be Trustees of said Church and shall serve in that capacity until the appointment of their successors according to the rules and regulations by which said Church is governed.

Sec. 3. That said Trustees or their successors in office shall have the care and management of the property real, personal and mixed belonging to the said Church corporation, and shall be accountable thereto for their official conduct and shall, in all respects, conform to its instructions, provided that the same are not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, or of this Commonwealth, or with the laws thereof.

Sec. 4. The said corporation shall have full power to make and use a common seal with such device or inscription thereon as they may deem proper and the same to alter or review at pleasure, and also to enact and enforce such By-Laws, Ordinances, and Regulations from time to time, as they may judge expedient for the prosperity and good government of the said corporation.

At a court of Common Pleas held in and for the County of Potter, commencing on the 16th of June 1856, in the matter of the application of A. G. Olmsted and others for a charter of incorporation:

And now, to wit, June 20 1856, the court having perused and examined the within instrument of writing, and the objects, articles and conditions therein set forth and contained appearing to be lawful and not injurious to the community, it is ordered that said writing be read in the office of the Prothonotary of said court, and that notice be inserted in at least a newspaper printed in said County, for at least three weeks, setting forth that application has been made to said court to grant to said applicants a charter of incorporation for the purposes specified, under the name and style of the First Presbyterian Church of Ulysses: and that all persons who are or shall be bound by the provisions of the said writing, be notified to appear before said court on the 19th day of July, next, at ten o'clock, to show cause, if any, why the same should not be granted.

Court Proclamation.

WHEREAS, the Hon. R. G. White, President Judge and the Hon. O. A. Lewis and Joseph M.
